



Can you make a stencil using one of the images on Photo Cards 4A?  
Make sure you understand the instructions below before you start:

### IMPORTANT: Working Safely

Use a cutting mat or board. Make sure the blade of your craft knife is not rusty, broken or blunt. You can test to check if a blade is blunt by cutting some scrap paper. Don't use an old blade – ask for a new one!

You don't need a ruler to cut, but if you do want to use one, only use a metal or metal-edged safety ruler.

Make sure there's plenty of space around you before you start cutting. Don't cut if someone's standing or sitting right next to you.

Always keep your non-cutting hand behind the blade, away from the direction you're cutting.

*Draw an outline around the part of the image you want to cut out.*




*Shade the parts that will be cut out. This makes it easier to see what your finished stencil might look like.*




*You can rub out any parts you want to change, or shade extra details.*

*Make sure you don't have any 'floating' unshaded parts. They have to be connected to the main, unshaded area.*



*Stick your picture to the card or plastic you're using for the final stencil.*

*With your non-cutting hand behind the blade and holding the stencil flat, carefully cut around the shaded area. Your cuts should always be away from your non-cutting hand. Turn the stencil round if you need to.*



*You can tidy up any ragged edges with the tip of the craft knife.*



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

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
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*You can tidy up any ragged edges with the tip of the craft knife.*

*On a second copy of your image, shade and cut out a different area. You can use this to create a 'layered' effect when painting your stencil. Try to picture how the two stencils will look before you start shading and cutting.*
