## What is Harvest Festival?

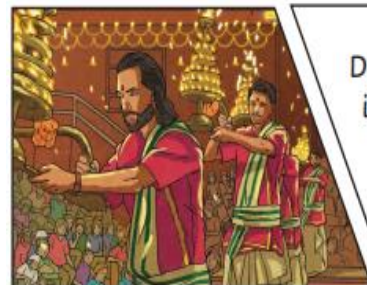
A harvest festival is a celebration of the food that is grown on the land.

Celebrations giving thanks for our food, happen in many countries around the world.

In Britain, harvest festivals are often celebrated in churches by bringing baskets of food to give thanks to God. People enjoy singing, praying, listening to stories and decorating the church.



## The Story of Rama and Sita



Diwali is the 'festival of lights' and is celebrated in late autumn. Diwali celebrates good's victory over evil with lots of lights around homes. Fire-works, presents and new clothes are used to celebrate.

## Key Vocabulary

**Celebration** - a special enjoyable event that people organize because something good has happened or because it is someone's birthday or anniversary

**Anniversary** - a date remembered or celebrated every year because of something special that happened

**Festival** - a time or event of celebration

**Harvest** - a celebration of the food grown on the land

**Christian** - a person who believe that Jesus Christ is the Son of God, and who follow his teachings

**Prayer** - words spoken to God

**Hindu** - a person that belives in a spiritual power called Brahman

**Diwali** - the Hindu festival of light. It is celebrated by millions of people around the world
