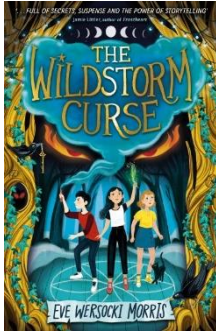




Library News: February 2023

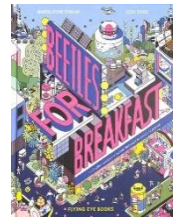
event and signing copies of her book after the event. Her book can be purchased on ParentPay.

Beetles for Breakfast... And Other Weird and Wonderful Ways To Save The Planet

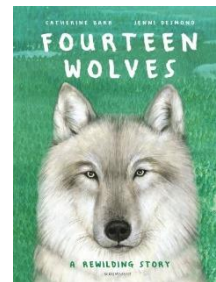


We all know the effects that climate change and global warming are having on our planet - but what about the strange, and often bizarre ways scientists are working to find practical and

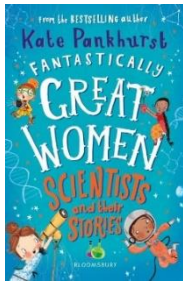
This is the story of their homecoming.

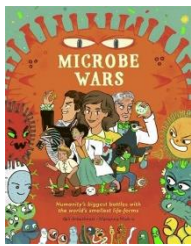

A fascinating and sometimes very funny account of the world of microbes. This is the story of what they are and how humans have tried (sometimes successfully, sometimes less so) to

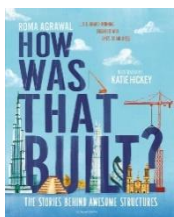
defeat them.

How Was That Built? The Stories Behind Awesome Structures



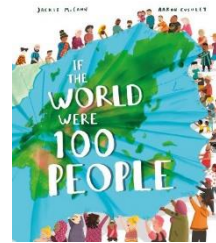

The whole school were treated to a brilliant presentation by five of the science panel discussing all the shortlisted books, announcing the panel's favourite three books and winner and giving Years 5 and 6 the opportunity to vote for their favourite out of our top three.

Who was our winner?

Each panel member gave each book a score out of 20, based on ease of reading, interest, look and feel and inspiration, then the panel voted for the winning book after reading them all.

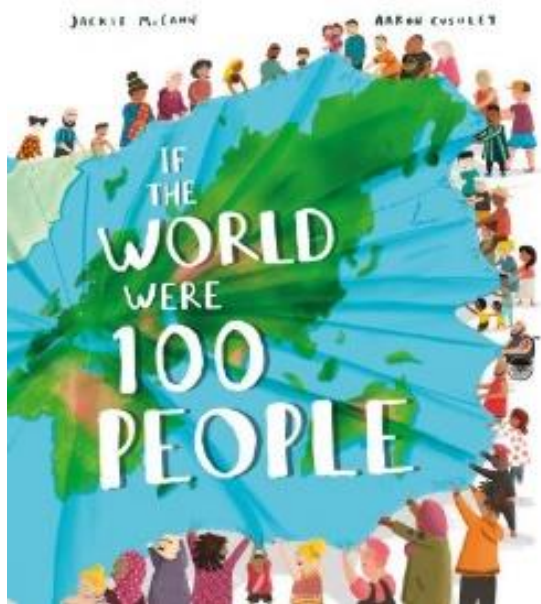
The Bathwick panel votes were sent to the Royal Society to be added to the national vote.

Our top three books were:

In 3rd place: Fourteen Wolves

In 2nd place: Fantastically Great Women Scientists and Their Stories

In 1st place: If the World Were 100 People



The Year 5 class favourite was Fourteen Wolves, whilst the Year 6 class favourite was If the World Were 100 People.

The overall national winner will be announced on 7 March 2023.

The six shortlisted books are available to borrow from the school library and are already proving popular! If the book your child wishes to read is on loan, it can be reserved using the library system or by asking in the library.

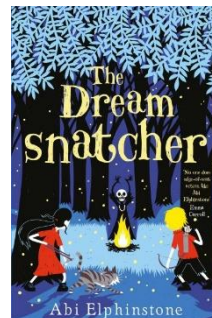
Lunchtime library session for Juniors
