History: How have seaside holidays changed since Victorian times?



Curriculum Key Question: Where have we come from? Topic: What lurks beneath?

What should I already know?

- EYFS: Elements from topics including schools and shops from the past.
- Y1: Victorian Period introduced as Florence Nightingale was one of the most famous Victorians.

Expected outcomes by the end of this topic:

- Compare and contrast similarities and differences in different time periods and developing sequencing skills.
- Children will learn about how Seaside holidays have changed since Victorian times. They will compare seaside's then and now.
- Clevedon case study
- To learn about events beyond living memory and develop comparing and contrasting skills through understanding what life was like in a different historical period that the children already have some knowledge of. They can develop the depth of their knowledge.
- Compare images or photographs of people or events in the past.
- Begin to discuss the usefulness of photographs / accounts / stories.
- Work with sources observe/handle sources (including written accounts, photographs, images, artefacts, videos) to answer questions about the past on the basis of simple observations.
- Encourage children to ask questions about artefacts and sources from the past (who, what, why, when, where?). Use of both primary and secondary sources.
- Identify different ways in which the past is represented.
- Children to group sources from different time periods studied and explain how they know.
